Another Set of CTS Letters to Be Read

Dear friends of CTS,

We lived this school year under the motto, "God makes us grow through relationships and circumstances and since we have both at CTS, let's grow!"

Once the apostle Paul wrote the members of a church that he dearly loved, "You yourselves are our letter..." (2 Cor. 3:2). As we conclude another blessed year, I would not be wrong if I told our graduating students, "You are our letter."

Some of the students I would call, "my Ephesians letter."

Throughout the school year they grew up quietly and steadily - they were on time for classes, did not miss any daily chapel and prayer time, and worked diligently on their assignments. They remind me of the Ephesians letter that does not deal with any particular church problem or a problem of some individual Christian. The Ephesians letter is not a problematic letter and right from the beginning abounds in praises, thanks and worship to God.

Some of the students I would call "my Philippians letter."

Facing circumstances and relationships, they constantly grew; knowing that they still had to work on a few issues that looked minor and yet, were of great importance - just like the Philippians letter - a joyful and very positive epistle with one little correction at the end of the epistle that often escapes our notice: "I plead with Euodia and I plead with Syntyche to be of the same mind in the Lord. Yes, and I ask you, my true companion, help these women..." (Phil. 4:2-3).

Some of them I would call "my Corinthians letter;" "my prison epistle," "my pastoral epistle."

Some of the days they faced turbulence caused by some circumstance, other people or themselves. Their growth happened under a temporary load of great challenges that affected their personality, learning process or even prayer life - just like many of these letters that contain great blessings from God, great progress of the gospel and yet challenges to be resolved. These are epistles in which joy and laughter are mixed with tears.

Some of them I would call "my Galatians letter."

These dear ones fought with the thought to abandon the call. Satan used doubt to put in question what God had spoken but thank God they persevered through the end. The Galatians were shaken up because of people who exercised wrong influence upon them – influence that would attribute God and His grace a second place in their lives.

Four possible categories of letters and yet I love them all! Regardless of whether they grew up the Corinthians' way, the Ephesians' way, the Galatians' way or the Philippians' way, today our graduating students are our letters: the new set of CTS letters.

The story does not end here. As they leave to serve the church I would remind them that the greatest endorsement and recommendation comes from above, "You show that you are a letter from Christ, the result of our ministry, written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets of human hearts" (2 Cor. 3:3).

The writing is over; they leave CTS to be read!

CTS Colloquium Introduces Students to World-Class Biblical Scholars

The annual event helps position CTS as a center for theological thought and discussion.

Over 75 faculty, students, staff and guests attended the recent 2015 CTS Colloquium which explored the subject, "Jesus as Divine Son: What Did He Know and When Did He Know It?"

According to Dr. David Courey, Dean of Graduate Studies, the purpose of the colloquium is to introduce students to world-class Biblical scholars like the featured guest this year, Dr. Stan Porter, President of McMaster Divinity College in Hamilton, Canada.

Dr. Courey encouraged students to listen to the messages as fellow students of the Bible. "I told them to listen closely to each talk for a thesis statement and then ask themselves if the speaker proved his point. I had a few tell me they learned how to write a better essay!"

"We also want students to connect theology with worship," said Dr. Courey. "In a world that questions who Jesus really was, Stan brought a series of Christ-exalting lectures which affirmed that Jesus had a strong sense of both his divine person and mission. I believe students walked away with a larger awareness of the reliability of Scripture and Jesus' consciousness of his calling and destiny."

A long-term goal of the CTS annual colloquiums is to position the seminary as a center for theological thought and discussion. "We hope to continuously bring world-class voices to our campus, for the benefit of our students and the larger Christian community," said Dr. Courey.

Others who presented at the 2015 Colloquium included: Dr. David Trementozzi, a new member of the CTS faculty; Dr. Patrick Nullens, Rector of the Evangelical Theological Faculty in Leuven; and CTS lecturer Ms. Johanna Wyrwal, currently working on her PhD in New Testament.

Institute for Islamic Studies Announces 2015 September Sessions

The Institute of Islamic Studies of Continental Theological Seminary has announced courses for the 2015 September Sessions.

"Ministry to Muslims in Urban Contexts" will be offered August 31-September 4, 2015 and "Folk Islam and Power Encounters" will be offered September 7-11, 2015.

"Both courses touch on areas extremely relevant for work in Europe among Muslims," said Dr. Sam Brelo, coordinator of the Institute. "Muslims are congregating in major cities in Europe, bringing a particular set of dynamics that will be focused on in the first course, 'Ministry to Muslims in Urban Contexts.' In addition to this, it seems that the Islam of many Muslims is really a 'folk Islam' that has adopted ideas from their countries of origin and/or host cultures where Muslims live."

Course instructors are Dr. Mark Hausfeld, of Springfield, MO and Dr. Don McCurry, of Washington, D.C.

"Both Dr. Hausfeld and Dr. McCurry have had many years of experience in vital ministry to Muslims," said Dr. Brelo. "Both are excellent scholars and have influenced scores of people through lecturing and writing. Students will be vigorously engaged by their dynamic communications skills."


The Institute of Islamic Studies at Continental Theological Seminary in Brussels offers intensive, one-week courses on Islam to prepare students for direct ministry to Muslims. Offered in an English-language international context, the courses involve classroom teaching as well as field experience in Brussels where the Muslim population is more than 15%.

"Many Christians inside and outside of Europe are hindered by an incomplete knowledge of Islam, negative attitudes such as fear, and the unfamiliarity of skills and approaches that will engage Muslims in a practical way," said Dr. Brelo. "Our courses address these concerns."

Students can register for one or both classes and take them for academic credit at a Bachelor's or Master's level or audit the courses for personal enrichment. Students taking the courses for academic credit must be enrolled in bachelor's or master's programs at CTS or a similar institution.

Deadline for registration is Friday, August 21, 2015.
