






From the Bishop's Desk —

A Legacy of Miracles, Ministry, and Unshakable Truth Bro. Roby & Sis. Connie Roberson House of Prayer – East Wenatchee, WA Serving faithfully since 1987

Some testimonies unfold like quiet chapters. Others burst onto the page with unmistakable divine encounters. For Bro. Roby and Sis. Connie Roberson, their lives are marked by both—tender beginnings, radical transformations, miraculous timing, and a ministry forged in faith and fire.

Sis. Connie first heard the name of Jesus as a little girl attending a Missionary Baptist church across the alley from her home on the reservation in Omak, Washington. But it was in her mother's yellow rose garden that she met Him. Just five or six years old, she recognized the nail prints in His hands and feet. "He laid His hands on my head," she remembers, "and told me I was going to do a great work for Him." From that moment, she was determined to never miss Sunday school.

While her faith was budding in Omak, Roby was being raised in Everett in a strong Christian family, active at Bethany Temple Assembly of God. He was known as an outstanding young believer—recognized with awards and deeply involved in church life. But in his teen years, a love for mechanics and speed pulled him into the world of fast cars, drag racing, and eventually alcohol. His first drink on September 4, 1966, led to 17 years of spiritual captivity.

In 1968, Roby barely survived a horrific rollover crash. Trapped under the car for three hours and in a full-body cast for eleven months, doctors now refer to his spine as "trashed." And yet, he walks—a living, breathing miracle with mobility that has baffled specialists for decades. "Unfortunately, throughout my 39 year PCG family relationship, I'm no longer recognized by hitting home runs at church camp as before but by my forward leaning, bent over posture from that accident." He says.

Connie, too, survived multiple near-death car accidents during her teenage years. Paramedics repeatedly said, "It's a miracle she's alive." But she didn't realize just how miraculous her life had been until a service at a PCG church in Oroville. A young man named David Roberts—without knowing her—prophesied that God had saved her twice and this was her final call. She ran to the altar and gave her life completely to Jesus Christ.

A few years later, on the morning of September 10, 1983, Roby awoke on the cement floor of his Stevens Pass auto shop. His shotgun was clamped in a vice, wire wrapped around his bloody wrist, and despair wrapped around his soul. It was his prodigal moment. "Like the son in Luke 15, I came to myself," he says. "the realization of who I was and what I had become came crashing down on me like a ton of bricks. I didn't need anyone to point out my sin. I just broke." With tears puddling on the floor, he cried out, "Lord, if You'll do everything my family says You can do for me, I'll do everything I'm supposed to do."

He would never be the same.

Soon after, Roby was delivering food to the local Hospitality House when he walked in holding two cases of hamburger patties—just as the men inside were praying, "Lord, we haven't had meat in a while. Please help us." The administrator looked up in disbelief. Roby recalls, "I couldn't believe what I heard—and they couldn't believe what they saw." He called his mom that day, overwhelmed: "Mom, the Lord used me as an angel!". He later became the chaplain and administrator there, serving for years.

One day, before cell phones were common, Roby was in Wenatchee and stopped at Denny's to respond to a page from the State Patrol. As he left the payphone, a man grabbed his arm and asked, "Are you the towing guy from Stevens Pass who just got saved?" Roby said yes, and the man asked if he'd be willing to testify at his church. He agreed—and that service would change everything.

The night for his testimony came. He rolled up on his Harley with the rest of the Christian Crusaders with his long beard, chains dangling – some with knives on their hips – we weren't your typical church goers. And there, sitting behind a piano bench, was Sis. Connie. She had dreamed of this man—literally. "I almost fell off the bench when he walked in," she laughs. "I had seen him in my dreams before I ever met him."

That was the night Roby and Connie first saw each other. "I was so impressed with the congregation and the pastor," Roby recalls, "that I ended up auctioning off my business, moving to Wenatchee, and settling into that church—where Connie and I were eventually married."

The Lord wasn't just restoring two lives—He was building a ministry.

As their love for evangelism grew, so did their involvement in missions, jail ministry, and outreach. Roby was eventually encouraged to pursue his Exhorter's License with the Pentecostal Church of God. Around September of 1987, they were attending a PCG church in Monitor, WA, when Superintendent Lawrence Haddock called with a simple request: could they unlock the doors of a vacant church in East Wenatchee "just in case someone shows up" that Sunday? It had no pews, no piano, no congregation—just bare, empty floors. Connie calls it "Dry Bones," like the song she and her daughter sing. Yet the Holy Spirit filled the room from day one. "I remember looking over my shoulder as he preached his first sermon on wives being submissive to their husbands – thinking, surely someone else has walked in." she chuckles "But it was just me."

They said yes—and have been there ever since. By October of 1987, they were officially pastoring what would become House of Prayer.

Though they walked with the Lord, Connie says it was a deep trial in 1995 that brought her to a new level of knowing Jesus. "We were found not guilty by 12 jurors, praise the Lord. That trial taught me to trust in Him like never before." Her favorite verse—Proverbs 3:5-6—has been her steady anchor:

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your paths."

Over the years, the church has seen both full altars and empty chairs. It once operated the largest food bank in Eastern Washington. Today, it quietly serves through the Daily Bread and Chips Pantry on the church's front porch, offering tortillas, chips, and whatever else God provides for those in need.

Bro. Roby and Sis. Connie have poured themselves into the work of the Lord without compromise—Because in a world chasing trends, they've chosen truth. They preach the real Word — meat, not milk — and are committed to discipleship over entertainment. In a world of watered-down messages, this church clings to the cross and the deep, soul-shaking truths found in timeless hymns like "The Old Rugged Cross." "Because, let's face it, the newer worship music is nothing like it used to be. Theologically sound hymns will always be favored in this church." He says.

Their daughter Rebekah often says, "Some might call us old-fashioned, but I've never been moved and brought to my knees by anything else like 'The Old Rugged Cross.' Hymns carry weight. They preach."

This year (2025) has been one of major change and fresh direction for the Roberson family. After praying for a way to bring their daughter Rebekah and her family back to Wenatchee to help in the ministry, the Lord made a way. The Roberson's traded their longtime home for two places just blocks from the church. Rebekah, James, and their sons Korbyn (age 15) and Kashtyn (almost 2) now live in the front house. Rebekah works at Colonial Vista Senior Living, James at A's RV, and little Kash keeps Connie busy chasing him around during the day while the family works.

Family Camp in Idaho, under the preaching and teaching of Bishop Redding, lit a fresh fire under the entire family—especially Rebekah. "Before we even unloaded the RV, she was already suggesting changes," Roby says. "With this new enthusiasm and help, we have nothing but wonderful plans for the future."

The now extended Roberson/Osborn family continues to serve the Lord with rekindled purpose. Their music ministry reaches into nursing homes and senior communities. Their preaching remains bold, their church committed to truth, and their Gospel undiluted.

"We can celebrate the victories of the past," Roby reflects—"the growth of the food bank, the courtroom miracles, even a FOX News documentary (In The Valley of Sin). But the greatest thing now is looking ahead to what the Lord is about to do."

Roby has never forgotten the first words Superintendent Haddock spoke to him: "Brother Roberson, don't ever refuse correction—be open and teachable." He also clings to the prophecy spoken over him at White Pass Camp:

"Let us not grow weary in well doing, for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not." (Galatians 6:9)

"I believe the dash of my life (from Bro. Lane's poem "Dash Between The Dates")—from September 10th, 1983 until now—has been fully redeemed by the blood of Jesus," he says. "That dashed life before is covered. And today, we're standing—stronger than ever—by His grace."

"We're still here," says Sis. Connie. "We're not discouraged. God is in control. There's no better place to be than in God's house."
