Eligible customers can access the Water Fund multiple times, up to \$500 per year. The program is administered by The Salvation Army and funded by generous donations from WSSC Water customers, employees and community partners.

Eligibility and Qualifications

As the administrator of The Water Fund, The Salvation Army is responsible for determining whether applicants qualify for assistance. Eligible customers may receive access to Water Fund multiple times, up to \$500 annually, to assist with their water/sewer bill. When The Salvation Army offices have reached appointment capacity for the month, the next available appointment is always the 1st Monday in the following month.
