- We did not knit our children together in the womb, God did that!
- Our words don't carry an ultimate authority, only God's Words do!
- We may make plans & decisions for the good of our children, but we can't guarantee that outcome, only <u>God</u> & <u>His plans can!</u>

"Many are the plans in a man's heart, but it is the purpose of the Lord that will stand!" Proverbs 19:21

Our knowledge, our authority, our influence is limited, but God's is not!

- God is all-knowing Romans 11:33-36, Psalm 33:13-15, Jeremiah 1:5
- God is all-powerful Psalm 147:5, Daniel 4:35, Job 42:1-2
- God is in absolute control Job 31:4, Isaiah 14:27, 46:10, Psalm 135:6
- God is a God who created all things, and He creates it all with purpose!
- God is a God who speaks & His Word reveals His good & perfect will!
- God is a God who ordains all that comes to pass! He declares the end from the beginning, & He does it all as a loving <u>Father!</u> Matt. 7:11; 1 Jn 3:1

These truths about God should be encouraging, & they should give us hope as parents/fathers, because we don't have to try to know everything, do everything & control everything - there is a good, good Father who does!

What does all of this have to do with Acts 4:23-31?

 In Acts 4, things didn't exactly go according to the apostle's plan, but their response demonstrated a trust in a much greater plan!

Context – The disciples had lost their leader, some of them had already been arrested for the message Jesus gave them to proclaim, they had been commanded to be silent & even their own people were rejecting them.

They must have questioned at some point:

- Did God really know that this was going to happen?

- Who is really in control? Is it the Jewish leaders, the Romans, God?
- Is this really the way it's supposed to be? How can this be God's plan?
- Does God really have our best interest in mind? Is He truly a loving Father?

If they asked themselves these questions, their questioning didn't last long b/c despite their circumstances they respond with worship & prayer!

Despite their limited knowledge, their limited power, & their limited authority, they responded with great trust in a <u>Sovereign God</u>.

By praying, "Sovereign Lord", the apostles were testifying to the truths that we declared earlier about who God is, even amidst our limitations.

- They acknowledged Him as the Creator of all things, therefore declaring that He is the One who is truly in authority over it all! *Vs. 24*
- They acknowledged that what they were facing was in accordance with what God had spoken long ago thru David, by the Holy Spirit! **Vs. 25**
- They acknowledged that everything that had transpired was done by the hand of God Himself, according to His <u>predestined</u> plan! – Vs. 27-28

This may not have been the plan that the apostles would have come up with, but they knew that what was transpiring was in accordance with a plan that was greater than their own – it was according to God's plan.

If the apostles could have such a perspective amidst their circumstances, how can we not trust God, as a sovereign Father, in ours?

If you are going through a tough time, if what you have been experiencing is rejection, if those in authority over us seem to not be doing what they ought, if it seems as though God & His plan are absent in your life, will you/will we respond as the apostles did here in Acts 4?

Will we pray, not against our situation, but for boldness despite it?

- Will we look for the evidence of God's hand & plan at work around us, instead of complaining that this isn't the way it is supposed to be?
- Will we lift up Christ no matter our circumstances?
