Talk is cheap, but should it be?

How would you respond if I claimed the Browns were going to win the Superbowl this year?

Matthew 5:33-37

It's important to look at these previous topics, because this isn't a <u>new</u> sermon.

The Pharisees and religious leaders prided themselves in following the letter of the law and felt that earned them the title of righteous before God.

God made covenants with Noah, Abraham, Moses, David, and the new covenant through Jesus.

God was never afraid to emphasize the importance of what He was communicating to His people through the use of oaths.

The Pharisee's were taking oaths by lesser things, thinking that it meant their words didn't need to be witnessed or judged by God.

They were trying to wiggle their way around rules using the letter of the law to do what they want, while ignoring the true spirit of the law

Jesus makes it clear in this sermon that God cares about our hearts and their condition.

We should be seeking to have the same will as God, knowing that whatever His will is, will be in our best interest as well.

Ephesians 2:1-10

But God steps in when our hearts are hard from anger, lust, and deceit, when our hearts are like stone, and He is merciful to us, because He loves us at our worst but does not keep us there.

Do not live your lives in a way that you must take an oath for your word to be considered valid and truthful.

We need to be very careful with how we make commitments in our lives.

Proverbs 13:3

Ephesians 4:29

Matthew 28:19-20

Our words have so much meaning and power, we cannot allow them to be used for evil purposes, but should submit them to God and his purposes for us in our speech.

"Talk is cheap?" Why is that? It's because words are often so easily and readily spoken even if they mean nothing.

We cannot afford for our talk to be cheap when we are meant to be ambassadors of Christ.

Challenges:

- 1) Always think before you speak.
- 2) Don't ever try to outsmart God.
- 3) Walk in the shoes that God has given you.
