 little more palatable. A little less challenging. A little less
 controversial. It seems as though Jesus is just saying to have more
 faith.
- Two men come to Jesus:
- The first comes and asks Jesus to follow him.
 - He likely expected Jesus to ask him some hard questions about Torah and the prophets and then be accepted as a student.
 - o But Jesus, rather than asking questions, explains the reality of following him. Following Jesus will inevitably include sacrifice and some suffering.
- Then a second man comes to Jesus. He is ready to make a huge commitment to Jesus, just not quite yet.
 - This is not an odd request. The first priority for a Jewish male, above all other obligations, even religious obligations was honoring his father and mother, in particular his father.
 - Everyone knew that these obligations came first. But not to Jesus. Even the most important obligations in our lives come second to following Christ.
- Jesus is not accepting applications for hobby Christians, for casual believers, for intellectual friends, but for faithful followers and imitators of Christ!

10 Signs of a Half-Way Faith

- 1. Crave acceptance from people more than acceptance from God.
 - a. They worry more about other people's opinions than God's opinion.
- 2. Rarely share their <u>faith</u> in Christ.
 - a. They don't talk about their faith in Christ and act as if it doesn't really matter.
- 3. Do whatever it takes to alleviate their guilt.
 - a. They go to church a couple Sundays a month or maybe decide to read their Bible for a few days.
- 4. Think more about life on <u>earth</u> than <u>eternity with God</u>.
