The Final Words of Jesus – I Thirst - John 19:28-29

- "Father forgive them, for they know not what they do." Luke 23:34
- "Today you will be with me in paradise" Luke 23:43
- "Behold your son... Behold your mother!" John 19:26-27
- "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Matthew 27:46
- "I thirst" John 19:28 Does it seem strange that there is a sermon here?

Isn't this statement just John recording what he heard Jesus say... or does this statement possibly have greater meaning behind it? <u>Yes!</u>

Jesus was thirsty! Wouldn't you be? Jesus carried a cross at least 600 meters (1/3 of a mile)... He was then nailed to that cross... He has been hanging there for hours at this point... This takes place in a desert climate...

Of course, he was thirsty... but that was not the only reason Jesus spoke these words! John's gospel rarely includes statements, or events, that do not have a deeper significance & meaning beyond what's on the surface!

Let's look closer at these 2 verses & the details surrounding this short phrase "Jesus, knowing that all was now finished..." What did he mean by that?

Jesus had finally satisfied God's law and justice in His flesh on the cross!

- His full divinity provided a worthy sacrifice for sin!
- His full humanity paid the penalty of sin in the flesh!

But some struggle to believe that this was truly what was happening... How can God become man? How can man (matter) embody God? How can God die? How can sin & suffering overcome God? How can this act save all?

Jesus' divinity had not yet fully been revealed, but it would be in 3 days. But his full humanity comes clearly into focus in these last two words... "I thirst!"

What is as human as acknowledging one of our most basic human needs... the need <u>for water?</u> Jesus thirst just like the rest of us! This detail, which can seem meaningless, and is easily overlooked, is incredibly important!

These 2 simple words answer some of the greatest questions of the faith, & defend against some of the greatest deception/false teaching in the church!

- Jesus was truly human... his suffering & this evil was not just an illusion!
- Jesus was not removed from his body before he suffered on the cross!
- Jesus, the God-man, went all the way to the finish line... to death!

These 2 words revealed a vital part of Jesus' true identity as human! But these words also serve another purpose.

"To fulfill the Scriptures..." Jesus was so keenly aware of what was taking place that his final words were fulfillments of Old Testament prophecy!

Psalm 69:21b – "and for my thirst they gave me sour wine to drink."

"I thirst" was a fulfillment of what was foretold about the Messiah long ago! And only John's gospel catches this detail! This was actually the third time he was offered a drink that day, but the only time he declared these words:

- Mark 15:22-23 Wine mixed with myrrh... but he did not take it!
- Luke 23:36-37 A drink of mockery... but he did not receive it!
- John 19:28-29 Offered in response to Jesus' words... This time received!

This is significant, not just because of its prophetical value, but also because of what this drink provided... This drink did not help him escape the pain... It did not provide an easy way out... This drink prolonged his suffering!

"So they put a sponge full of sour wine on a hyssop branch & held it to his mouth." Is there anything left to glean from these words/this verse?

Sour wine was common wine, reserved for common use. Similar to the wine Jesus used at the <u>Last Supper</u> (common elements, but filled w/ special meaning).

This moment on the cross was the fulfillment of that previous moment with his disciples. And if the wine wasn't enough to make that connection, then consider the hyssop branch... Where in Scripture do we see this branch?

In the very event that the Last Supper celebrates... <u>Passover!</u> God's people used hyssop branches to paint the blood of the lamb over their doorways to spare their lives. And here, it is the blood of the Lamb of God being spread upon on the cross, which would become the doorway to heaven!

These 2 words "I thirst"... the man... the wine... the branch... All of it, Jesus wanted us to see the immeasurable significance of this moment on the cross

He also wants us today to thirst for that which <u>eternally satisfies!</u>
Jesus is the only one who can satisfy our eternal thirst.

John 4:10 – "If you knew who you were talking to, you would ask of me and I would give you living water and you would never thirst again."

Do you thirst, & have not been quenched? What Jesus did on that cross is what provides us with "living water" so that we never thirst again!

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
